

On Friday and Saturday, March 17 and 18, the Friends held our traditional *Indoor Yard Sale*, netting just under \$1,600. Then, on Sunday, March 19, the Friends' Library Cart Drill Team marched in the *Mystic Irish Parade*, winning "Most Unique" for the second time. For the record, our team won "Best Community Group" in 2015, and "Most Gregarious Unit" in 2017. We believe the Library Cart Drill Team's marching in the Irish Parade is a great way to remind a large audience of our wonderful library.

Two weeks later, on Sunday, April 2, Friends and patrons of MNL joined Friends from the other two Groton libraries for our 14th *Edible Book Festival*! Covid had prevented this event from happening for three years in a row, so we were very pleased to have about

ninety people in attendance, many of them experiencing the Festival for the first time. There were two dozen Edible Book entries from individuals and many from students and their families. All were delicious and it was a big success!

Finally, on Monday, April 3, our monthlong *Art Sale* opened. We are so glad to return to our pre-Covid activities, especially with some new faces in attendance!

The Friends hold some programs for fun, like marching in the *Irish Parade* and cosponsoring *Edible Books*, while other programs, like our *Book Sales, Silent Auction*, and *June Fair* exist mostly to raise money to support MNL's needs. Words from our Director, Christine Bradley

The May 1st Keynote Address of the 2023 CT Library Association conference was Leading Change for the Next Generation of Librarians and their Users. What does leading change mean in 2023

for the 750 members of the Association, founded in 1875, (even older than the Mystic & Noank Library!) and the almost 200 public libraries in CT?

A look at the conference program tells a lot.

A change for the worse this year was the increase in book banning and censorship, hence the workshops Writing Responses to Material Challenge and The Fearless Guide to Hosting Courageous Conversations.

It seems that change for the next generation also includes some concerns that are always with us-

that doesn't stop us from embracing the change in our lives, hence Making Progress on Climate and Equity,

Adult Programming Through a Social Justice Lens, and Nama'Stay in my Chair and many others.

Now that we are (hopefully) beyond Covid, the need to address those buildings to which our users have returned was evident. It Takes a Village to Raise a Library! and Renovating for Future Users were popular topics as well as Become a Gigabit Library - New ARPA Funding for High-Speed Fiber Connections! (M&NL is one of 70 libraries in CT which already has high speed internet through the CT Education Network). Pop Up

Libraries was held in the Mystic Marriott parking lot, featuring M&NL's book bike with our



own Becca Spera.

Technology, public health concerns, wars, economic unrest all create changes to our society. The message to CT librarians at their annual conference was that librarians must provide and demonstrate the leadership needed for next generation of librarians and library users.

The Pivot to **PROGRAMMING** in the Library World

You've probably heard the recent adage that libraries "aren't just about books anymore." The Connecticut State Library's annual report data over the years illustrates why.

Statewide, libraries have experienced a dramatic decrease in the circulation of print materials.

Meanwhile, the circulation of electronic materials, the number of public access computers, and program attendance have all seen big increases.

These national trends motivate many libraries' emphasis on programming, despite the occasional grumble about too much noise in the library! We've had to adapt to changes in people's

information needs and information's ready availability on "the Google."

Compared to the year 2000, MNL has seen a 50% decrease in total circulation of physical (as opposed to digital) materials. In the same time frame, MNL reported an almost 250% increase in the number of program offerings and a pretty astonishing 600% increase in program attendance since 2006 (prior years were unreported).

2021 was the first year MNL reported greater than 10,000 total program attendees since we began keeping track. Even during the pandemic, we were able to reach more people than ever with our program offerings!

As a final comparison, we can look at how

MNL's statistics weigh against the average for all Connecticut libraries as calculated on the State Library's annual report.

Despite serving a population roughly 40% smaller than the average library's 21,622, MNL's live program attendance was still 55% higher than the average library.

That tells us two

things: we have some pretty passionate and dedicated staff and we are lucky to have a community of supporters, Friends, and library lovers who take the time to check out what's going on each week at the library!
