By the time this reaches your mailbox it will be mid-May, a busy month here at the Library. In preparation for the Silent Auction and the Library Fair we will be relocating parts of the collection. The New DVDs and most of the Books on CD will be moved to the Adult Fiction book area. If you're having trouble finding something, please ask a member of the staff.

For those of you who enjoy watching movies and TV shows that aren't always the most recent Hollywood hits, I would like to remind you of two different options you have with your MNL library card. I recently signed up for Kanopy, which is a free streaming service available using your library card. You are allowed 8 streams per month. The other option is our rotating collections through the Connecticut Library Consortium --one is more current movies and the other is Foreign Language and Independent Cinema productions, including many BBC productions.

You may have seen a new face at the Circulation and Children's desks recently. Catherine Cummings joined us in March. Some of you already know Catherine from her previous employment at Mystic Seaport. She received her MLIS last May from Simmons College and is a welcome addition to the staff.

BOOK CLUB CORNER

Representatives from 15 local book clubs attended our twenty-first Book Club Forum held on April 17th. The representatives each spoke about two or three of their club's favorite reads from the past year. Some of the selections generated good discussions. A list of the selected titles and their authors is available at the Circulation desk and will be on our website soon. It is a good resource for those looking for something interesting to read.

I am currently reading one of the books discussed at the Forum. *Citizens of London: The Americans Who Stood With Britain In Its Darkest, Finest Hour by* Lynne Olson was published in 2010. It is an amazingly detailed history/biography of three Americans, 2 diplomats and one war correspondent stationed in London during the years leading up to America's entering World War II. The author used many primary sources, including private diaries and letters, to tell the stories of John Gilbert Winant, Averell Harriman, and Edward R. Murrow and the roles they played in standing with Britain during the very difficult years of the late 1930s and up to December 1941.
