Rather than proceed to the next Librarian I want to talk about the Local History section. The books are in locked cases because of their value to researchers. One set, "The Descendants of Robert Burrows", is the go-to source for almost all the early Groton settlers. You can imagine my dismay when I found that the set has disappeared from the shelves.

It is a resource that you can find online, but using the actual book with its extensive index makes discovering the information much easier. I don't understand how someone would feel that their research was more important than everyone else's. It is my hope that the books will be returned in the book chute so that the rest of us will again have access to this valuable resource.

I have requested that the Library look at the usage policy and consider making using this collection more controlled. I have also requested an inventory of the collection be conducted so other "borrowed" volumes may be identified. It saddens me that the Library's trust was violated in this way.

On another note, Judy Hicks and I have just completed a draft of a book we are calling "A Gift to Mystic"......a history of Capt. Elihu Spicer and the Library. It is our plan to get it published and to donate the books to the Library to sell as a fundraiser. We will keep you posted on our progress.

A Night to Remember

April is Poetry Month, and Mystic & Noank Library did it proud this year. We are blessed among public libraries for so many reasons, chief among them being that we have a resident poet, Philip Kuepper. Many of you have read Philip's poems in this publication, but Monday night, April 29 was a unique occasion to hear Philip speak his words.

Philip bookended our Evening of Poetry with two of his favorites, *The Minefield of the Imagination* and *A Flowering Spring*. (Somewhere in the middle I took the liberty of reading my favorite of Philip's poems, *Putting on the Garment of Water and Light.*)

What an Evening it was. It was a sellout needing extra chairs, a tribute to our Mystic reading community. We heard from young Lyd and Roberta Curry, and Bruce Jones of the Groton Town Council reading The Cremation of Sam McGee that he recalled from his recent trip to Alaska. Gail Turgeon blew me away with her three short poems Mixology, German Stock, and Good Grief. Accomplished poet Colin Goedecke shared his original work, and Rich Freitas read his own Divorced Kid's Christmas. (I can still envision that Miller Lite Christmas Tree!) Lisa Ann Curtis read Amanda Gorman's inauguration poem. Finally, Kevin Booker wowed us all (as he always does) with a tribute to poetry and a succession of poetry bursts from ancient times to Langston Hughes to Tupac, and ending with A Dream Deferred.

One of the many things the Library offers is a remedy for loneliness.

Now, maybe you don't visit our Library often, maybe this sounds counterintuitive to you. Aren't libraries quiet? Don't the librarians tell you to "shhhh!" and give you dirty looks when you return a book late? The short answer is "no"—the long answer is that libraries have really come a long way since the days of old...and particularly since reopening after what felt like an eternal hiatus during COVID quarantines.

We noticed something that never went away: book clubs. I don't know about you, but I found a community in virtual book spaces during the *dark times*. ALL of this to say, when I came on board at Mystic & Noank Library as the Circulation Supervisor, I was excited to take on the responsibility of gathering books for the many book clubs in our area.

Over the course of the past two years (WOW I've been here two years?) I've really made it a goal to get ahead of the game and have titles ready, stay in touch with the fearless book club leaders, and let people know that this is a service we offer!

The first was a stray found wandering downtown who made it into the Library in the 1970's. Melvil Dewey (named after the person who developed the Dewey decimal system), or Dewey for short, was fond of getting into and out of the Library via the book drop chute, back when books could be returned directly into the Library building. He often ventured out to visit neighbors and, after around two years, moved into the neighbor's house permanently, though he often returned to the Library for a visit.

The second cat was a sick stray found in a window well by a fire escape. Named John Doe, this kitty was also an indoor/outdoor cat. After much care and attention, he returned to good health and went on his way.

These cats opened the doors to the more familiar cats that many of us knew/know and love and, hopefully, the Mystic & Noank Library will continue the tradition of cats in libraries.
