(Continuing series about Library Directors...)

When Richard Arms became Board President in 1984, he challenged the Library Board to start a major campaign to raise money to increase the size of the Library building. Shelves of books were crowded and programming space was limited. The Board accepted his challenge and began an effort that would take over 8 years to complete.

It became a community effort with neighborhood informational gatherings, newspaper coverage and surveys to determine what the Board should consider including in their expanded facility. The main issues



proved to be moving the children's room onto the first floor; no more climbing to the second floor for books and programming. The second priority identified was to provide a meeting by Joanna Case, Friend of the Library and Former M&NL Director



room for public as well as Library use.

Committees were formed to address specific issues. Fundraising was put into "full speed ahead". Board members approached the towns of Groton and Stonington for support in this effort. Both towns responded to the request; now it was time to come up with a definite plan.

A building committee was formed and an architect hired. Charles King of Avon, CT was hired because of his extensive history of restoring old buildings with a reputation of adding an addition that melded so well that people often questioned the different dates of construction. The initial plan called for an underground addition off the East wall of the building. This was the only space available for increasing the building's footprint. (*to be continued.*.)

From Festival to Fair

This year's Annual Spring Fair will be held on Saturday, June 7, 2025 from 9 am - 2 pm.

Newcomers to the area might wonder how many years this event has been held. According to an article in the April 1979 *Friends'* newsletter, the first Spring Festival was held on Saturday, June 2, 1979 from 11 am - 4 pm. It was organized by the *Friends* to be a part of the larger Mystic Spring Festival, coordinated through the Chamber of



Commerce, held May 26 - June 3, to celebrate the 325th anniversary of Mystic.

The Festival was intended to focus public attention on the Library and its services, facilities

and needs, both indoors and on the grounds. Some parts of the Festival will be familiar to current Fair goers - the Book Sale and the Plant Table supplied by the Mystic Garden Club are still main attractions of the Fair. There was also a Bake Sale (which ended with COVID), and games of skill as well as an hourly film program for the children, a Silent Auction, crafts demonstrations and music, as well as punch and cookies, made for a fine day as reported in the next issue of the newsletter (October 1979) which states "The buyers were enthusiastic, the weather was beautiful and the workers were generous with their time and talents." The profits from the first "Spring Fling" as it was then named, "totalled over \$500, which was used for special projects for the Library." (cont, on p.8)



What's going on with federal funding for libraries in CT?

In **1964**, President Johnson signed into law the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA).

LSCA operated from **1964 to 1996** (Yours truly was the CT State Library's LSCA coordinator in 1979, when the State Library received a little over \$1 million from LCSA.) LSCA was replaced by the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA).

The Museum and Library Services Act of **1996** transferred library programs from the Department of Education to IMLS.

The Museum and Library Services Act of **2003** updated the Act and increased the basic grant to a state library.

in **December 2010**, President Obama signed The Reauthorization of Museum and Library Services Act of **2010**.

On March 14, **2025**, President Trump issued an Executive Order intended to dismantle seven federal agencies, including the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS).

On April 4, 2025, the Connecticut State Library received Notice of Termination of Federal IMLS

Grant. Under this grant, the State Library was awarded \$2,164,184 to support the statewide library services, programs, and infrastructure that enable information and education access to the people of Connecticut. More than 56 percent of that

funding has yet to be sent to Connecticut.

Since 1997, Connecticut's libraries and museums have received more than \$90,000,000 through IMLS.

The CT State Library has not yet made a decision about their


federal budget, but these are recent LSTAsupported projects that have benefited MNL:

- Professional Development Webinars
- E-Rate Programs for libraries to improve broadband access
- Statewide Delivery system (1.5 million library items to 215 public and academic libraries in FY24)
- Statewide library catalog for patrons to access items from across CT with a single search
- Statewide eBook Platform of 50,000 books for CT residents
